6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

MTTC has made every possible effort to enrich the existing curriculum by initiating a variety of experiential learning opportunities that would help to translate its mission statement and goals into reality. The threads of the vision and goals of the College are reflected in all thrust areas of college life. This not only provides academic flexibility but also helps students to learn the importance of human values and strive for excellence at the level of each ones' potential. Confirmation and recognition is evidenced by the ease of placements and progression to further study, nationally and internationally.

### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Integral Pedagogy Paradigm (IPP) is followed, which emphasizes context, experience, action reflection, and evaluation, It emphasizes cooperative learning, interactive learning, group learning, meaningful verbal learning and use of advance organization approach as proposed by Ausubel. Tutorials will be essential part of the teaching methodology. The habit of self-learning is promoted through home assignments, library work and group work. For internship experience the student teachers are required to attend the mass prayer of the school, taking attendance of the students, preparing timetables for absentee teachers, preparing bulletin board, organising thanksgiving function, invigilating examinations, preparing school diary etc.

### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Students are continually tested and evaluated in the form of content tests in method subjects and theory subjects. There is provision for two tests and the scores of the first test are used for remedial teaching and academic guidance. The students will be given to pass the subject. Participation in tutorials, debates, quizzes, presentations, case-studies, projects, practical test and many more modern tools will also be used. Each method which is proposed has specific learning purpose. The level of interaction of the students in these activities will be used to assess them. This assessment will help the teachers to have comprehensive assessment of a student. Similarly, case study methods will enhance the real business problem understanding of the students. This assessment method is very useful in evaluating the skills of the students to deal with the real life situations. The presentation will also be used to assess the students. The students will be benefitted by the fact that they will not be assessed on a single test. The performance of a student could be affected by variety of reasons; some of them are beyond their control. Using these modern methodologies of assessment those beyond the control factors could be taken care of.
